Department of Bengali, Jamini Roy College

Programme Specific Outcome

Students will develop a strong concept History of old, Medieval and Modern Bengali Literature. They will learn the special texts and get introduced with cultural changes coming out of these writings. Programme Outcome

Course Outcome

Our classical literature was really rich and profound. The present students are fascinated by Western culture and literature, they hardly look back to find their own culture. So, their course prepares the unripe students to find solace in rich culture and literature of their own. They receive moral education through our own literature.

The students learn about the adaptations of Eskimos and Santhals to

environment, Development and environmental conflict, social morphology and types, pattern of rural settlement.

SHGEO/202/C-4P Cartograms and Thematic Mapping 1. The students become capable to understand the nature and characteristics of Geographical Data, they can represent socio-economic and climatic data and plot it on line, bar, pie graph, wind rose, ergograph, age sex pyramid and so on. 2. Students become efficient of representing data on the maps through dot, sphere, choropleth diagrams, they understand the measures of inequality and measures of interaction. 3. The students become skilful to use topographical map (OSM series) and can analysis various morphometrical phenomena such as Drainage Density, Frequency etc. and interpret the physical & cultural elements of the map.

Department of History, Jamini Roy College

Programme Specific Outcome (PSO) – History Honours & Programme

Contrary to popular perception, the study of History as we know it today is a modern phenomenon. Till the first half of the 20th century historians were mainly concerned with the political history of people and nations. At best, economic history was incorporated into the understanding of the past. However, the meaning and scope of the subject has since broadened to incorporate sub-genres like social history, military history, cultural history, environmental history, local history and even unusual subjects like culinary history. History is not a mere collection of data about the past; rather historians attempt to identify trends and patterns based on said data. Given the widening of horizons teachers of history today have a greater responsibility to bring students up to date about how they think about the subject. Therefore, the History courses both at the Honours and Programme levels aim to inculcate among students: -

- an appreciation for the connotation of the word “History”
- how History is written
- how we arrive at an understanding or explanation for the past of India
- we introduce students to the history of world civilizations and cultures
- we introduce undergraduate students to the “allied” subjects of history like archaeology, museology and archival studies

- we incorporate multi-disciplinary and inter-disciplinary approach to Historical studies
- history is not just an account of a bygone era; it lives on in us – we make sure students appreciate this idea

Course Outcome (CO) – History Honours & Programme

Jamini Roy College offers 3-year Honours & Programme Courses in History in which there are 6 Semesters. The college was affiliated to the newly set-up Bankura University in the year 2017. At the same time the changeover from the previous annual examination system to the Choice Based Credit System and Semester pattern was introduced by Bankura University. Prior to 2017 our affiliating university was the University of Burdwan.

The specific papers offered in History Honours are AHHST 101 C-1 History of India (Prehistoric Times – 600 B.C.), AHHST 102 C-2 History of Classical Greece, AHHST 103 GE-1 History of Ancient India, AAHST 201 C-3 History of India (600 B.C. to 650 A.D.), AAHST 202 C-4 Medieval World (Fall of the Roman Empire, Medieval Europe, Coming of Islam) and AAHST 203 GE-2 History of Medieval India. The specific papers offered in History Programme Course are APHST 101 C-1A History of Ancient India and APHST 201C-1B History of Medieval India.

The first batch of students under the newly introduced semester system will complete graduation in the year 2020. Therefore, any measurement of Programme Specific Outcomes is a challenging task at this juncture. Moreover, the University has not yet provided any PSO to the affiliated colleges in Bankura District.

Keeping in mind aforementioned constraints we may mention some Programme Specific Outcomes below:

1. PERIODIZATION IN HISTORY – Students will become familiar with the classification of History into various periods like Ancient, Medieval and Modern. They will also learn that this periodization may vary from country to country and continent to continent. They will also learn to appreciate the difference between Pre-Historic and Historical periods in understanding the past.
2. DEBATES AND DIVERSE EXPLANATIONS OF HISTORICAL PHENOMENA – Students will understand the way in which different schools of thought within the discipline explain particular events or the subject as a whole in different

ways. This will inculcate their capacity to entertain diverse opinions while being able to form their own ideas based on research.

3. INTER-DISCIPLINARY AND MULTI-DISCIPLINARY APPROACHES – History, like most other subjects in academics does not operate in a vacuum. Rather, as a social science it is part of a group of subjects like political science, economics and sociology. Besides this, as a part of the larger group of “Humanities” subjects History has a deep relationship with world literature. Therefore, the student will learn how understanding Historical phenomena may be placed in the context of understanding other social sciences and humanities subjects.

4. SKILL ENHANCEMENT COURSES – The incorporation of Skill Enhancement Courses on topics like Museums, Archives, Archaeology and Popular Culture will further not only multi-disciplinary understanding of the subject but also introduce the student to real world applications of historical knowledge with a job-oriented dimension.

PROGRAMME OUTCOME (PO)

1. EQUALIZATION OF OPPORTUNITIES: The CBCS aims at ending discrimination that previously existed between honours and general courses of study. Under CBCS, both honours and program course pass-outs (previously general) would be eligible for pursuing Postgraduate Courses of studies.

2. FREEDOM OF CHOICE: This is the Choice Based Credit System after all, and students are comparatively free to choose subjects according to their interest.

3. RESEARCH ORIENTATION: Research orientation is inbuilt into the new courses and it is expected that more students will look at possibilities of research more favourably.

6. JOB ORIENTED STUDIES: The Interdisciplinary and contemporary approach of the CBCS will enhance the students’ access to the current job market.

7. REDUCING THE GAP BETWEEN LOCAL AND ALL-INDIA MODE OF STUDIES: Students more equipped to appear in all-India competitive examinations because this system is being uniformly introduced all over India. It is hoped that students will be better equipped to appear at all-India level competitive examinations for civil services and other pan-Indian services.

Department of Sanskrit, Jamini Roy College

Program Outcome (PO)

Expressing human attitudes is the utility of language, without language it is not possible to communicate properly. Therefore, it is very difficult to move without language, different languages exist among different human groups. Multiple languages also exist in India. However, there is one state language as a national unity. Subjugated India was forced to accept the language of the English ruling class as the state language. Even if you aiming for a bright career only, Sanskrit can provide it, till today. Harvard of Cambridge oxford to Trinity college Dublin – can end up with a faculty post in some highly ranked universities,
6. Mode of Hindu Survival: Sanskrit and only Sanskrit is the language which should bubbles up in our mind even if we merely think about Hindu Survival.
7. Practical Advantages: If someone does not know Sanskrit he is obviously missing something. He cannot get the clear perspective of Vedas, Geeta, Upanishads, Ramayana, Mahavarata, Arthashastra and many the books, which

are still regarded as the compositions of humanity by a large portion of our society.
